The Radio Flyer is published monthly by the lowa City Aerohawks, a radio control flying club, and distributed free to members, by e-mail and USPS mail. Non-members may receive the newsletter by e-mail as a PDF file, by request. Spectators are welcome at the Aerohawks' flying field and clubhouse at 3860 Hebl Avenue, west on Melrose Avenue, west of HWY 218. The field lies on reclaimed land near the entrance to the lowa City Landfill. New members are welcome at any time, regardless of level of skill.

Club Membership is \$60 annually. The Club requires that members volunteer to help with work projects from time to time. Members must also join the Academy of Model Aeronautics, (the Iowa City Aerohawks are AMA Chapter 824). Flying members must also have a valid FAA UAS Registration Certificate, and must complete the AMA TRUST Certification process. The Club has an active, free instructional program for beginners. AMA Hqs and National Model Aviation Museum, Muncie, Indiana

In Early August, I took my grandson to tour the National Museum of the US Air Force at Wright-Patterson Air Force Base in Dayton, Ohio. On our way back to Iowa City, we stopped at the Academy of Model Aeronautics Headquarters Facility outside Muncie, Indiana, in order to tour the National Model Aviation Museum there.



The museum was immediately to the right as we entered the 1,000 acre complex. We learned that in addition to the Headquarters building on our immediate left, the complex consisted of nearly 1,000 acres of grass fields within what appeared to be about 10,000 acres of mature corn! We were fortunate to be there on one of the of the National Control-line finals competition!

We first toured the museum. Though my grandson (age 17) is not a modeler, he was duly impressed with the wide range of historical artifacts contained in the museum. For a long-time modeler, both builder and flyer, I was thrilled to walk down model aviation memory lane. One highlight was to see a finished model of a circa 1953 rubber-powered



free-flight Taylorcraft Guillow balsa kit – the first model airplane I ever built! There were literally hundreds of finished airplanes, old kits, gas engines and even some early radio control devices. My grandson was most impressed with the 10-ft B-36 hanging on the wall in a side annex to the building.

The staff was extremely knowledgeable, and very helpful as we perused display after display of model aviation memorabilia. After a huge dose of nostalgia, we ventured to view the six flying fields, all in operation simultaneously.

As a former control-liner myself, I enjoyed some of the speed flying and the stunt flying competitions, but was most impressed by the C/L combat event! As an unfortunate consequence of high speed 'combat flying', we witnessed several crashes. We visited with modelers from the UK, Japan, Germany, Australia and New Zealand while spectating. But my grandson was most impressed with the model



helicopter free-style flying competition. This competition was the most well attended of those taking place, with more than 500 people milling around the spectator area.

If you should pass through the Indianapolis, Indiana area, Muncie is only a short hour's drive northeast. I thought the trip worthwhile, especially for anyone with a history of model aviation, and suggest it should be on any serious modeler's bucket list.

October- Transportation and Storage

Hot and Sharp Objects.

After flying don't forget about the pokey propellers and hot motor, and any dripping fluids from your aircraft.

Damage to aircraft and transportation.

Fitting as many different models as possible in your trunk will be a great way to find the weakest part of your aircraft and tear up inside your vehicle.

Forgetting something?

Check around before leaving, some items are set right in front of your eyes and will be a shame to leave behind, drive over, or fall out.

Contents May Have Shifted.

Simple supports/ties keep most items in your vehicle steady. Thirty seconds to secure aircraft and cargo will save toes and hours of repairs.
